





The Cars America Lost By Hollis Rule

STUDEBAKER Part XV Studebaker, the Patriot



The Year 1939

On the national scene on January 1st, the well known electronics manufacturer, Hewlett-Packard was founded in a one-car garage in Palo Alto California. On January 5th, after a two year search for the famous aviatrix, Amelia Earhart, she was declared dead. On April 14th, John Steinbeck published his beloved novel, Grapes of Wrath. While the Great Depression was slowly disappearing and life continued to improve in America, events on the world scene were growing dimmer. The Empire of Japan was determined to dominate Asia and the Pacific, and had been at war with the Republic of China since 1937. Hitler



had been gaining control of Germany since he was elected chancellor in 1933, and on September 1, 1939, his Nazi army invaded Poland.

The Years 1940 - 1941

Japan continued to invade and dominate China and the surrounding Pacific. The Nazis, through a series of campaigns and treaties, controlled much of Europe, and formed an Axis alliance with Italy and Japan. Starting in June of 1940, the only forces left to fight against the Axis nations were the United Kingdom and the British Commonwealth. Through all the turmoil, the American public wary of the disturbing world events, tried to look the other way not wanting to get into another foreign war.

Meanwhile, back in South Bend Indiana, Studebaker was one of the first auto manufacturers to begin producing war materiel. As early as 1938, the company received urgent orders; first from Belgium, then soon from Holland and France. The orders were for K-30 series Studebaker trucks. We haven't discussed Studebaker's role in truck manufacturing in this series simply because the focus has been on automobiles. Beside their early attempt to build trucks back in the days of Studebaker Electrics, they also built some light trucks in the E-M-F days. Then, in 1929, they became serious about truck manufacturing and until South Bend closed its doors at the end of 1964, built a full range of trucks. Over the years, the company built everything from beautifully styled pickups to diesel semi-tractors. Look for a short series on Studebaker trucks later. Now, back to the trucks needed by Belgium and other European countries for defense. The K-30 trucks were heavy duty units, built from 1938 through 1940. They were 3 ton haulers powered by a Hercules 98 HP engine. Wheelbases ranged from 142 inches to 184 inches. They were just what were needed to defend the freedom of Europe. Unfortunately, with Hitler's takeover of much of the continent, the trucks were confiscated by the Nazi's, converted to synthetic fuel (due to a lack of petroleum), and used against the Allied Forces. Studebaker was working overtime to supply their K-30 trucks for the defense of Europe, and was just as busy supplying passenger cars to Americans. The little Champion, with its outstanding styling, low price, and low maintenance was a big hit.


RUNNING ON EMPTY

The Delinquent and the Mentor

George was a troubled boy. His mother had been hospitalized with a mental breakdown. His father worked six days a week running a saloon. With little parental guidance, George ran the streets of Baltimore, when he should have been in school. Finally, he was placed in a reform school called St. Mary's Industrial School for Boys. The year was 1902, and he was only seven years old. At St. Mary's, George attended school and learned trades. He learned to make shirts and do carpentry, but he was still a discipline problem. As such he came under the watchful eye of Bother Matthias, the school's disciplinarian. Brother Matthias was a large man, athletic with great strength. He encouraged George to join a team in the school's baseball league, where George might learn teamwork and discipline. George admired Brother Matthias for his strength, especially when he would hit fly balls for outfield practice. Brother Matthias had a smooth, looping swing of the bat that produced towering fly balls. George had demonstrated some natural athletic ability as he tried playing different positions and mimicked the looping swing of Brother Matthias at the plate. One day his team's pitcher was having trouble finding the strike zone, and George was laughing and berating him with insults. Brother Matthias decided to teach George a lesson and put him in to pitch. The lefty George responded with a blazing fastball that surprised everyone. Soon he was the team's main pitcher, developing control and a nice curve ball along the way. Eventually he was placed on the school's traveling team and was scouted by the Baltimore Orioles, who placed him on a minor league team. He was traded to a minor league team for the Boston Red Sox, and he made his major league debut with the Sox in 1914. George Herman Ruth Jr. was given the nick-name "Babe" by his team mates, because of his round baby face. Babe Ruth soon surfaced as the best left-handed pitcher in all of baseball, and in five years as a pitcher he amassed a record of 94 wins and 46 losses, leading the Red Sox to three World Series championships. In December of 1919, his contract was sold to the New York Yankees, who moved him to the outfield, because he had also developed into the best power hitter in baseball. In the next 15 years, Babe Ruth's hitting led the Yankees to four World series championships. In his career, Babe Ruth amassed 714 home runs and 2213 RBIs, and he had a lifetime batting average of .342. He led the American League in home runs 12 times. He is considered by many to be the best baseball player in history. With all these accomplishments on the baseball field, Babe Ruth never forgot St. Mary's School or his mentor, Brother Matthias. He made donations to the school throughout his entire life, and in 1926 he presented Brother Matthias with a brand-new Cadillac. Ruth realized that his 12 years at St Mary's and the influence of Brother Matthias served to change his life for the better. The moral of this story is two-fold. First, a proper mentor can help make great changes in a person's life. Second, we must all realize that a friend or acquaintance may be able to see potential in us that we may not see in ourselves. Our old car hobby offers ample opportunity for us to answer questions or provide advice for a newcomer. Showing our cars

at tours or car shows may be the spark that causes a young child to love old cars. You just might be a mentor already and not even know it.
