CO-PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Gene Autry was a multi-talented star of radio, TV and film in a long career that spanned the 1930s through the 1950s. In his career he made nearly 100 films and wrote more than 600 songs, including South of the Border, Back in the Saddle Again, and Mexicali Rose. He also gave us Christmas standards like Rudolf the Red Nosed Reindeer, Frosty the Snowman, Up on the Housetops and Santa Clause is Coming to Town. He was the ultimate singing In his radio days, Gene had two radio shows, Gene Autry's Melody Ranch and The Adventures of Champion, Gene's horse. He realized that he had a young audience. Cowboy movies and cowboys had become all the rage, and every young boy wanted to be a cowboy. Gene wanted to be sure that his radio depiction of cowboys would present a wholesome image, so he came up with a Cowboy Code. The rules of the Cowboy Code are listed below.

- 1. The Cowboy must never shoot first, hit a smaller man, or take unfair advantage.
- 2. He must never go back on his word, or a trust confided in him.
- 3. He must always tell the truth.
- 4. He must be gentle with children, the elderly, and animals.
- 5. He must not advocate or possess racially or religiously intolerant ideas.
- 6. He must help people in distress.
- 7. He must be a good worker.
- 8. He must keep himself clean in thought, speech, action, and personal habits.
- 9. He must respect women, parents, and his nation's laws.
- 10. The Cowboy is a patriot.

When I ran across this Cowboy Code recently, I wondered if we shouldn't have a similar code for old car guys and gals. To that end, I have prepared one. While this code is still a work in progress, here is what I have come up with so far.

- 1. The old car person should be tolerant of old car people who collect other brands of cars.
- 2. He or she must always make an effort to help another old car person in distress. At least offer to call AAA for them.
- 3. He or she must respect the spouse. Do not initiate an engine rebuild when you've been told that dinner will be in 15 minutes.


The Recovery

Both of the two key executives, Albert Erskine and Fred Fish, resigned when the company failed. had to make quick decisions in order to salvage the company. Those decisions were not only made quickly, but they were right. The company had a bevy of qualified executives from which to choose. However, the two that floated to the top were Paul Hoffman and Harold Vance. Paul Hoffman started his career as a car salesman and soon established his own business in Los Angeles. He quickly became the world's largest Studebaker dealer. By age 34, he had made his first million dollars. In 1923, Studebaker convinced him to join the company as vicepresident of sales. Harold Vance had joined the organization in 1910 when he obtained a job as a mechanic at E-M-F. The reader may recall that Studebaker took control of E-M-F that year, and soon the brand became Studebaker. Vance continued at the Detroit Studebaker plant moving up to production vice-president. He was then in charge of the final move of the Detroit operations to South Bend in 1926. By the time of the bankruptcy, he was Studebaker's vice-president.

Appointed by the bankruptcy court as trustees, these two men, Hoffman and Vance saved Studebaker from extinction. Not only did they save the company, they worked to change the bankruptcy laws, helping save countless future corporations.

Paul Hoffman appointed by the courts to work with Vance in reorganizing Studebaker. Hoffman was named Studebaker's President after the reorganization.

In 1933, the standard procedure for a bankrupt company was to sell the assets, use the money to pay off the creditors as much as possible, and close the business. The two men, along with legal counsel, went before congress and convinced congress that the real value of Studebaker was as a going concern. Workers would still have jobs; could pay taxes, add to the economy, and help save our nation from the depths of the depression. Congress was convinced and began changing bankruptcy laws. Some of the bankruptcy laws we have today are a result of the changes made to save Studebaker.

Land Speed Records Come Back to America

When I was a kid in Ohio in the early 1960's, there were numerous attempts at the land speed record that were always in the news. First came Mickey Thompson with his *Challenger*, a futuristic streamliner with four Pontiac engines. The car was so named, because he was challenging the British dominance of land speed records that lasted from the mid-1920s with Henry Seagraves and Malcomb Campbell through the 1930s with Malcolm Campbell and George Eyston, to the 1940s with John Cobb. Indeed, when the 1960s decade opened, Cobb's 1947 record of 394 mph still stood. Those British cars of that era all followed a similar formula; they were built by aviation engineers and ran 12-cylinder aircraft engines. car magazines were following Mickey's exploits, and I was glued to each new issue. Mickey was a California hot rodder and drag racer in a home-built car with automobile engines trying to bring the record back to America. His car was built in his garage, and the only backing he had were four free V-8 engines from Pontiac. His only regular crew member was another California drag racer named Fritz Voigt. In 1960, they took the car to the Bonneville Salt Flats and recorded a one-way run of 406 mph. The land speed record requires a two-way average, and the second run must be made in the opposite direction within one hour. (This format eliminates any assistance from prevailing winds). Mickey could not make the required second run, as his car suffered mechanical damage on the first run, and it could not be repaired in time. Mickey kept working on the Challenger in hopes of breaking Cobb's record officially, when another team showed up on the salt. Craig Breedlove, another California hot rodder/drag racer had built a jet-powered car called Spirit of America, and he set a new record in 1963 at 407 mph. A huge controversy followed. Mickey Thompson protested the record, claiming that a jet powered car should not be allowed to compete. The jet engine didn't even drive the wheels. A wheel-driven, piston -engine car had a lot more parts that could break under the strain of a record run. The jet car had a huge advantage. After many debates on the subject, the land speed record was finally split into two classes, one for wheel-driven cars and an unlimited class that would include jet cars. That seemed to open the flood gates for land speed records, as new jet car teams arrived on the salt, and more records were set throughout the 1960s. Art Arfons and brother Walt

Arfons, two drag racers from Akron Ohio, brought jet powered cars to Bonneville in 1964. Art drove his Green Monster and Walt's Wingfoot Express was driven by Tom Green. In October of that year, five new records were set starting with Tom Green at 413 mph on October 2nd. Three days later Art set the record to 434 mph. Then Breedlove bumped it up to 463mph on the 13th and to 526 mph on the 15th. Then Art Arfons came back on the 27th and set the record at 536 mph. The five records that month raised the land speed record by almost 130 mph. of 1965 saw a similar round of record setting. On November 2nd, Breedlove raised the record to 555 mph. Five days later, Art Arfons bumped it up to 576 mph. then on November 15th Breedlove set a new record at 600.601 mph. In just three years from 1963 through 1965, the land speed record surpassed 400, 500 and 600 mph. As a young teen in the early '60s, I followed these exploits wide-eyed through the pages of the car magazines. My dad was a drag racer, and I loved the fact that all these records were set by drag racers. My dad even knew Art Arfons from Art's drag racing days in Ohio in the 1950s. what happened to the wheel-driven record during this time? In 1964, Donald Campbell of England (son of Malcomb Campbell) set the wheel driven record at 403 mph in Australia with a new version of the *Blue*bird, powered by a gas turbine (turbo-prop) engine. The following year the Summers Brothers of California set it at 409 mph in the Goldenrod, powered by four Chrysler hemi engines. So that record also came back to America In the 1960s.

HISTORIC APALACHICOLA, FL LIGHT HOUSES, HISTORIC HOMES AND SEAFOOD DELIGHTS.

Friday 5/19: (Continued)

Secondary to the promoters of the Constitutional Convention, St. Joseph's population had reached 12,000 by 1840, although St. Joseph still could not compete commercially as a trading port with Apalachicola. The boom town of St. Joseph created in 1835, lasted about nine years, and was a considered a pleasure resort town. However, in May - June of 1841, yellow fever reached epidemic proportions in the entire territory with St. Joseph hit especially hard as the population declined from fewer than 6,000 to 400 in less than one year. Followed by two hurricanes in September and a forest fire later that Fall of 1841, it was said that "God pointed His finger at St. Once class let out, Ron, Pam, Gareth and I jumped into the '34 Victoria and hit the beach and sandy shores of St. Joe Peninsula State Park, along the forgotten coast. Across the street was the Cape San Blass Lighthouse, built more than 130 years prior when Congress appropriated \$8,000 to erect the original structure. It was in service by 1851 and guided vessels around the shallow shoals, that ran out from the cape, using a beacon that could be seen for 10 miles offshore. The lighthouse survived storms, high surf and even an attack by those pesky Union troops in 1862. However, Tropical Storm Isaac (2012) did it in, claiming its shoreline. The lighthouse was moved to Port St. Joe in 2014 along with two keeper's cottages. One cottage is now a gift shop/museum. No, we did not climb the 140-step spiral staircase to the top balcony. Photographs said it all.



Driving back toward town we noticed the Windmark Beach Development. We saw quaint home sites, condos, retail shops, office space, bike paths, beaches and paved streets. But we did not see one single person or a car. Maybe they haven't opened for business yet. Sort of like "build it and they will come." Leaving the Windmark Beach Development ghost town, we stopped for lunch at the Krazy Fish Grill in St. Joe. Yummy, family owned and tasty was their fare. Thanks to Ron browsing the local attractions, tomorrow we are off to the Tupelo Honey Festival in Wewahitchka, FL or Wewa as the locals call it.

Saturday 5/20:

Off we go to Wewahitchka for the honey festival and what a delightful day we had. Vendors, galore, singing groups, artists and of course Tupelo honey. We can't go anywhere without buying something for our grandchildren, so Anders got a dress and Holden a marshmallow blow gun, miniature marshmallows only though. We hit the Krazy Fish Grill for lunch again and no surprise they remembered us, must have been the car. Back to Apalachicola to cruise the town again, we discovered the Oyster City Brewing Co. for a tall cold "Red Right Returning" beer prior to going back to The Hole in the Wall for our farewell banquet. We loaded the '34 back onto the trailer after dinner and packed up our belongings for our return to the suburbs the next day.

Sunday 5/21:

Bidding the Coombs Inn goodbye, we headed home by way of Wakulla Springs State Park and Lodge. This is where the Creature from the Black Lagoon was filmed, you may recall. The lodge was built in 1937, has 27 rooms. Other interesting features include "Old Joe" an 11-foot, 650-pound stuffed gator that used to swim in the tropical pool formed by Wakulla Springs. The Lodge also boasts the world's largest marble bar (70 feet 3 inches) and a restaurant with southern specialties. We did not eat there though. Out on the grounds and near the swimming area, we did notice one of Old Joe's relatives, maybe a 5-foot gator. We had not planned on swimming in the lagoon and this gator definitely sealed the deal. Ron and Pam had bought us a dash plaque in the gift

shop, for the '34 that showed the Lodge with an elegant old car parked in the foreground. Yet another memento of a super tour to Apalachicola, FL with our tour guides Ron and Pam. Well worth the visit if you have not recently gone or like me have never visited this piece of Florida history.
