

STUDEBAKER Part XIV Beyond the Banckruptcy

The Loewy Connection

Until the early Thirties, emphasis had necessarily been on engineering for all auto-makers. However, by the early to mid-thirties, all cars were mechanically reliable. To compete, the manufacturers needed to turn their attention to styling. Studebaker was obviously aware of this, perhaps more than some of its competitors. One only has to view a Pierce Silver-Arrow (hand built at the Studebaker facilities), or a 1934 or 1935 Studebaker Land Cruiser to realize the emphasis Studebaker placed on styling. By the mid thirties, the company had recovered the bankruptcy, reorganized, and had working capital for serious new development. Realizing they didn't have enough inhouse experience, they began looking for a stylist in touch with the times. In 1936, they found that person; Raymond Loewy. The French born Loewy was actually an industrial designer, but he could apply his talents to just about everything imaginable. The press referred to him as The Man Who Shaped America, The Father of Streamlining and The Father of Industrial Design.



Some say he started his career designing lingerie. Whether it's true might be disputed, but when he first came to America, his first work was as a window designer for department stores such as Macy's and Saks. Next, he was a fashion illustrator for Vogue and Harper's Bazaar. He even styled refrigerators for Sears. Some of his most impressive early work was with the Pennsylvania Railroad, designing streamlined shrouds for their steam driven passenger locomotives. Loewy always maintained

his own studios, working for Studebaker as a consultant. His first design work began on the 1936 models, but by 1939, the beautiful, streamlined Studebakers were all of Loewy's design. From that point forward, all Studebakers were either completely or partially styled by Loewy Studios. His last project for the company was a forty-day crash project that we know today as the Avanti. Ofttimes, it was styling more than engineering that sold cars in the Forties and Fifties. Loewy's crisp, rakish and streamlined styling was just what Studebaker needed in order to sell their product against the stiff competition. Undoubtedly, it was Loewy's work that put Studebaker back on the map and helped them become America's largest independent auto-maker.

Get Your Kicks

When I was a kid growing up in southern Ohio, one of my favorite TV shows was Route 66. In this weekly show, two young and virile guys named Tod and Buz, played by Martin Milner and George Maharis, roamed from town to town along Route 66 in a Corvette and somehow had a real adventure every episode. It was never explained where they were headed or why they didn't have regular jobs, but somehow the entire concept seemed to be very cool to this ten-year-old fan of Corvettes in general. The show debuted in the fall of 1960, and it was a hit from the start. The two stars somehow got a new Corvette every year (The show was sponsored by Chevrolet), and some episodes were filmed in places where Route 66 didn't go (like New England), but I didn't care. Two guys roaming the US in a Corvette seemed to me to be the idyllic life. Route 66 was famous for being among the first US federal highways, after the advent of a universal system for route identification. In the early days of the automobile, roads were often un-named, and map makers like Rand McNally would mark roads with their own coding system. No two such coding systems were alike. This led to confusion, so the federal government began the numbering of routes. In 1926, Route 66 was planned to link Chicago with Santa Monica, California, a distance of 2448 miles. Construction began in 1927 through both road building and the connecting of existing roads. It was not entirely Route 66 served as the main paved until 1938. route for the Midwest farmers who fled to California during the famous Dust Bowl drought of the 1930s. It became a major route for vacationers as the automobile became the travel mode of choice for America. Many new businesses began to pop up along the way, as motels, drive-in restaurants and service stations flourished. During WWII, there were mass military movements along Route 66, as aircraft manu-

facture grew in Southern California. In 1946 Nat King Cole recorded his hit song, *Get Your Kicks on Route 66*. Over the years, the road was being referred to as the *Mother Road, Main Street of America* and the *Will Rogers Highway*.



In 1956, when President Eisenhower signed the Interstate Highway System into law, it was a death warrant for many old routes like Route 66. As the Interstate Highways were built, sections of Route 66 began to die and some disappeared altogether. Finally, in 1985 the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials decommissioned Route 66 as a federal highway. In order to preserve the remaining sections of the famous highway, Route 66 Associations started in Arizona (1987) and Missouri (1989). Soon other states along the route formed similar associations, and much of the route survives today as "Historic Route 66" or as state roads designated with similar numbering (e.g., 66, 266, 366). Thanks to these organizations, much of the celebrated route is still around, and many car clubs and motorcycle clubs run nostalgic tours along the legendary route. Wouldn't that be a great tour, to ride along Historic Route 66 in an old car? It wouldn't even have to be a Corvette.

See you on the road; possibly even the Mother Road.

LEWIS AND CLARK TRAIL MISSOURI SEGMENT

Continued from last month.

Tuesday, April 24th: We drove through gorgeous countryside, past farms, cows and flowering Ornamental Pears and Red Bud trees on our way to Daniel Boone Home & Gardens in Defiance, Missouri. His home was a beautiful stone structure built by Nathaniel Boone, Daniel's son, with walls that were approximately 18 inches thick. The land was given to the US by Spain with the stipulation that 18 acres of wooded land must be cleared each year in order to remain in possession of the property. That in addition to raising 12 children growing crops and shooting bears. Daniel Boone and his wife Rebecca lived

with their son and his family from 1804-1813. And then for much of the time from late 1816 until Boone's death in 1820. A rifle lay across the bed in the room where



Daniel Boone had died. Washington, Missouri is the corncob pipe capital of the world with the Missouri Meerschaum factory located on the river. This is where the Missouri River reaches its Southern point. There were settlers at this location when Lewis & Clark started their Voyage of Discovery in 1804. The Churchill Museum is in Fulton, Missouri. The central element of the National Churchill Museum, is the Church of St. Mary, Aldermanbury, a 17th century church moved stone by stone to Fulton, Missouri from the city of London. This church once stood in the center of London, England, where Nazi bombs gutted it during the Blitz of WWII. Today, the church looks much as it did in 1677, carefully restored to recreate the building that architect Christopher Wren designed after the Great Fire of London destroyed the original 12th century church. Seems as though Winston Churchill was going to be in the States and was requested to come and visit this college and its reconstructed church. Beneath the church is the Churchill Museum. This I must admit Gareth and I did not see. The car pooped out at a round about just outside of the college and we hobbled to a parking lot, before attempting to find a Discount Auto Store for a new condenser. This dear

fellow closed his business and took Gareth to the Discount Auto shop and waited for him to complete his purchase. These folks in Missouri are incredibly kind!

Wednesday April 25th: Jefferson City and we tour Modern Litho Printing who print the Bulb Horn magazine. After getting a behind the scenes tour of the place we depart for the Missouri State Capitol and the Governor's Mansion. The capitol is the third capitol in the city after the first two were demolished by fire. Completed in 1917, the domed building is topped by a bronze statue of Ceres, the Roman goddess of agriculture and there is lots of farmland in Missouri. A wrap around mural designed by Thomas Hart Benton and entitled a Social History of The State of Missouri was finished in 1936. The mural was met with criticism initially because it featured a naked baby having its diaper changed in the city. Also, there was illustrated the gambling side of those in power. Eventually the artist convinced the public this was Missouri



life and the social history from its earliest days. The current site of the Governor's Mansion sits on a bluff overlooking the Missouri river and was the vicinity of the first Jefferson City

Missouri State Capitol building from 1825-1837 after the capitol was relocated from St. Charles, Missouri to Jefferson City. The current structure was built in 1871 at a cost of \$75,000 and has served every governor since. The mansion was built in 8 months with much of the work performed by prisoners of the nearby penitentiary. The author of the children's book *Goodnight Moon*, a personal favorite of mine, was written by the Margaret Wise Brown, the grand-daughter of first governor B. Gratz Brown 1871-72.
