

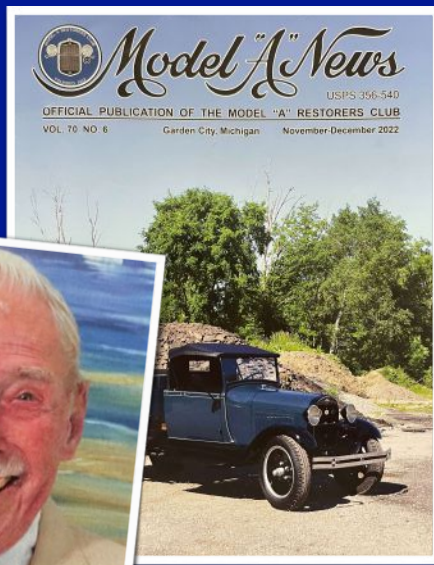

Congratulations on being inducted to the “Model A Ford Hall of Fame as 2022 inductee. **Arthur F. Callan** developed a strong interest in Model A Ford car and was active in MARC and MAFCA organizations. In the 1990s he served as a Trustee of the Model A Ford Foundation, Inc. (MAFFI) and later took on the role of Executive Director to manage the day-to-day operations. Art’s inspirational planning efforts made it possible to create the Model A Ford Museum. He led the charge to increase Foundation membership, earn the support of MARC and MAFCA, and develop a building agreement with Gilmore Car Museum. He continued as MAFFI’s Executive Director until 2014. Few Model A enthusiasts have done more than Art Callan to expand and benefit the Model A Ford community. Prior to the pandemic he was also a Winter resident of Dunedin and actively served here at Heritage Village working in the H.C. Smith General Store as a member of Pin-MAR.

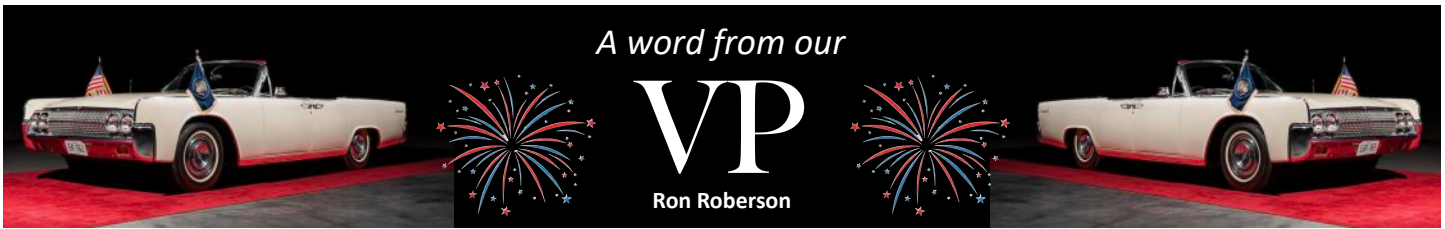

The Pin-MAR Antique Car Club, Inc. is a not-for-profit corporation founded as a club in Pinellas County, Florida, in 1964. (Pin-MAR is an acronym for the Pinellas Model A Restorers) The club's founders were dedicated to restoring and preserving the Model A Ford. The club now accepts members with all makes, models, and years of vehicles. Meetings are on the first Thursday of each month at Heritage Village in the Pinellas Room or as announced in this newsletter. The club dedicates time and resources to Heritage Village, including volunteers who run the H.C. Smith General Store, care for the period garage display, and maintain the park's antique vehicles. The club also conducts tours, outings, an annual Picnic, an annual Car Show, and sponsorship of the Heritage Village General Mercantile & Garage. It's a fun, all-volunteer club for the entire family, with annual dues (Jan1-Dec 31) set at just \$20.00.



BACKING UP THE HILL

Recently, when I was working as a docent at the Heritage Village Mercantile, I followed a group into the garage to tell them about the garage display and the individual cars. I do this whenever the rate of foot traffic allows me to leave the store section, and I will tell as many Model T stories as people want to hear. This group seemed quite interested, so I kept the stories going. Then one lady in the group shared that her grandfather had a Model T, and he had told her that he always used the reverse gear to drive it up a steep hill backwards. I asked if she knew why they did that, then I proceeded to go into a “Show & Tell”.

I walked them around to the 1925 TT truck, which has no doors and had its hood raised to show the engine. I reached into the cab (ignoring the “Do Not Touch” sign momentarily) and lifted the seat to show the location of the gas tank. Then I pointed out the low mounting point of the carburetor, where the gas enters the engine, noting that the Model T had no fuel pump and relied on gravity to deliver gas to the engine. If a driver headed up a steep hill in a forward gear, especially if the gas tank was not full, the carburetor could get higher than the gas level, and the car would stall. By backing the car up the hill, the gas level is always higher than the carburetor. Then we

walked over to the 1928 Model A phaeton, and I pointed out the gas filler neck protruding from the cowl. The tank had been moved upward into the cowl in order to solve that problem.

This story makes for a great demonstration, that has been improved by the addition of the Model A to the garage display. Using the Model A, you can also point out that the crank is gone, front brakes were added and the Model A has safety glass in the windshield. Indeed, the Model A was the first car in the US to incorporate safety glass. The Model A also has a lower stance, because the roads had been improved since the Model T debuted back in 1908, and the high ground clearance was no longer necessary. The Model A also serves to show that colors besides black were available and the two 1925 Model Ts flanking it were made in the last year that Model Ts were all black. All in all, the Model A phaeton, donated by the

Taylor family, has been a great addition to the garage.

The Model T tool kit that we have on display is another good piece to highlight. A car owner had to be a bit of a mechanic to keep one on the road back then, especially with the early Model Ts, as both the tires and the roads weren't very good in 1908. Cars today don't come with tools, but they do come with a manual that tells you not to drink the battery acid. (That's progress?). I usually end the session by telling them to take a picture of the Model T coupe and save it to their phone. Then the next time that guy calls wanting to extend your car warranty, tell them “Yes, and here's a picture.”

See you on the tours. Try to keep up with the Model Ts.

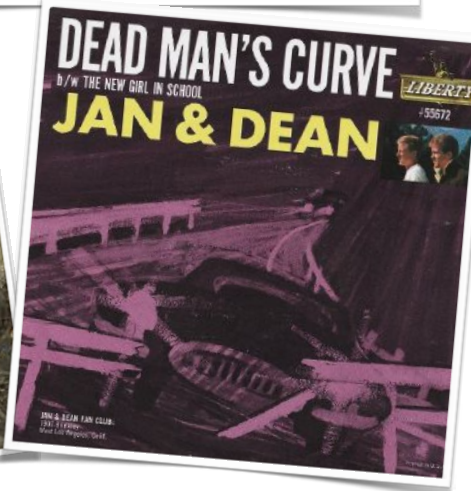
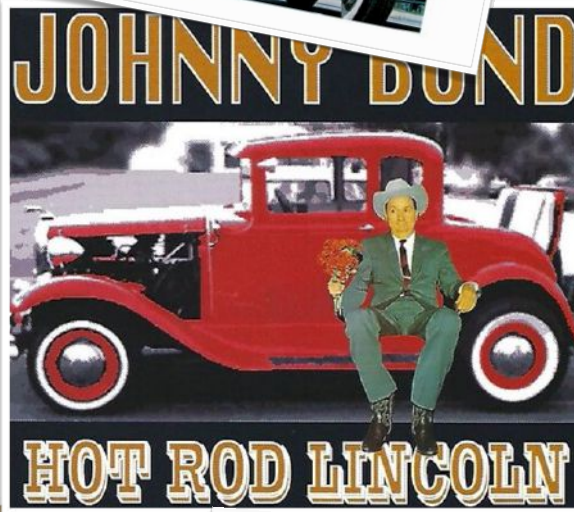
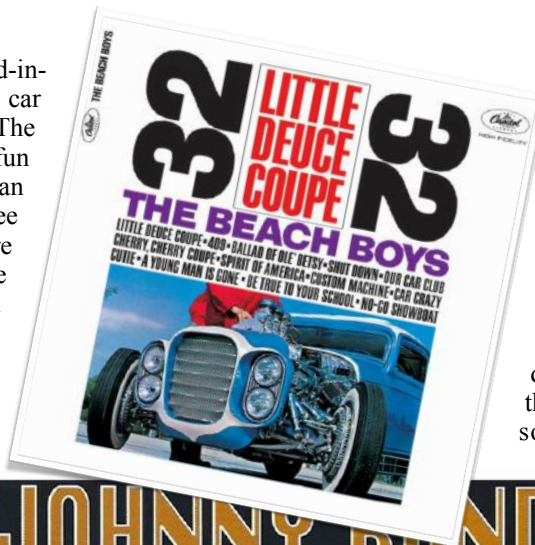

CAR SONGS WE LOVE

Cool cars and music have historically gone hand-in-hand. When I was a teenager in the 1960s, car songs were as common as warts on a frog. The Beach Boys sang about a Little Deuce Coupe, fun in Daddy's T-Bird and a real fine 409 Chevy. Jan & Dean sang about Dead Man's Curve, a Three Window Coupe and racing at Drag City. There were also songs about GTOs, Cobras and a little old lady from Pasadena. Then Johnny Cash sang about building a strange version of a Cadillac out of parts pilfered from his job at the factory. Even Jerry Reed asked the perennial question, "Lord, Mr. Ford, What have you done?" followed in the 1970s by John Travolta's mixed metaphors about a car called "Greased Lightning". In the 1950s we had a Little Nash Rambler blowing the doors off a Cadillac, a car called Maybellene and a kid driving his dad to drinkin' with his Hot Rod Lincoln. Where did it all start? Were car songs around even before these?

The automobile first appeared in the US in the 1890s with inventors like the Duryea brothers, Elwood Haynes, Alexander Winton, Ransom Olds and Henry Ford all building their first cars. By the year 1900, there were over 100 car builders around, who had all built at least one car. The earliest cars sold were cars that were built one at a time, usually to the buyer's specifications, and they

were very expensive. The automobile was called, "The Plaything of the Rich". In 1901, The Olds Motor Company introduced the first mass produced car, a single cylinder, runabout with tiller steering. That became the first affordable car, and 19,000 were sold between 1901 and 1906. In 1908, Henry followed



that with the Model T, the first vehicle mass produced on a moving assembly line. That brought the prices down even further, as 15 million were built between 1908 and 1927. It was those mass-produced affordable cars, enjoyed by the masses, that produced the first car songs.

In 1905, a hit song (in those days a hit song was determined by the number of sheet music prints sold as well as Edison's wax cylinders) hit the market with the line, "Come away with me Lucille in my merry Oldsmobile". It represented the first of a long line of car songs, including songs about the famous Model T, and even songs about the Model A replacing the Model T in 1928. There was "Poor Lizzie, What Will Become of You Now?" followed by "Henry's Made a Lady out of Lizzie."

Car songs have been around for more than a century, but what will we hear in the next century? Will anyone write a song about their Kia? Or Tesla? And what could possibly rhyme with Toyota or Subaru? Let's try one.

I'll tell you Boy, you're gonna drive me to drinkin', if you don't stop driving' that hot rod Hyundai.

A hot rod Hyundai? It just doesn't work. See you on the road. Find that oldies station and turn up the volume.

Wow, just got the latest Pin-MAR News, by Editor **Mike Culotta**. It was like getting a copy of Classic Car Magazine via email. Bold colors, lots of color pictures, Headlines and news we can use. I'm impressed and pleased with the Professional level publication in a small club.

I hope we're sending copies to the Old Cars News, who recognizes individual clubs Newsletters.

Fifty years ago this year, I joined PinMAR when it was only a 9 year old club. We didn't have a newsletter and meeting notices were occasionally sent out by the Secretary on a Post Card, announcing the site if the next meeting. Maybe the meeting would be in **Tommy Small's** Nursery Boiler Room, the AAA Office, a Bank or S & L Conference room. a S & L S on 49th Street, or maybe somebody's garage. Meetings were just for guys. Later the club decided that girls and women didn't really have cooties and wives were included.

I had a Royal portable typewriter and was a fair typist. I discovered **Bob Croslin** to be full of stories among other stuff and we decided to do a Pin-MAR Newsletter. One of the members wife was a school teacher and we tried the Mimeograph machine a few times. Remember the purple ink?

We found that we could take a picture to a copy store and get it dot-screened and add pictures to the News, next we discovered peel & stick address labels and fast copy shops. We would finish the news and get it printed and take it to **Bill & Jennie Milhalko** who would fold, staple address, stamp and mail them.

Larry Romig was a contributing writer with his "What is it?" stories about stuff found in the General Store and his "Why we say what we say" column. He used a computer and taught us a bunch. He was then the Editor for a couple years, followed By John & Billie Gill in the early 1990's.

Then **Gail Handel** took the Editors job and her computer knowledge, added color and more pictures and graphics along with teaching us how to electronically send the News to the print shop. **Hollis Rule** edited it from his summer home in North Carolina for quite some time too.

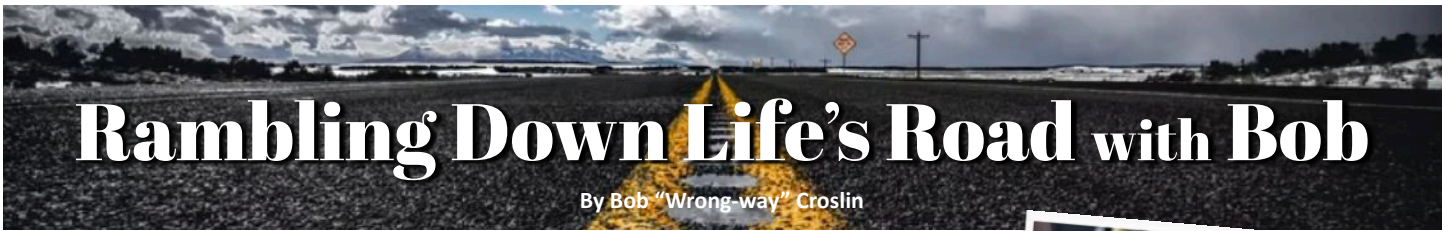

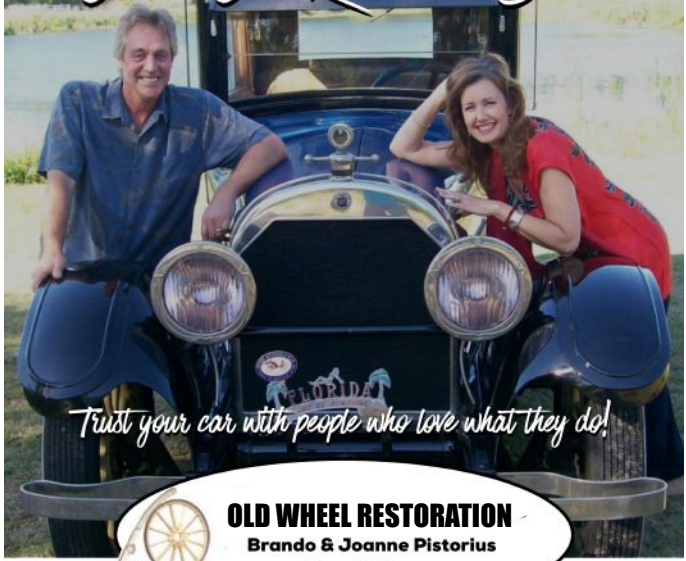

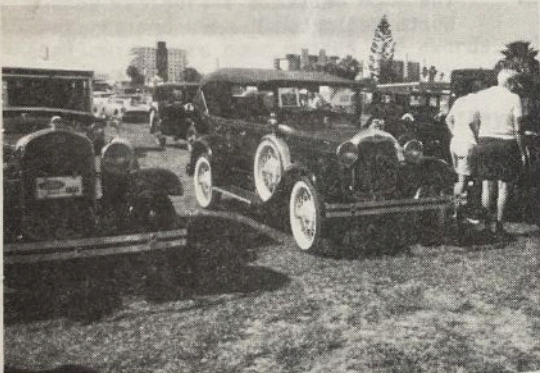

GULF BEACH CAR SHOW A SMASH HIT

If you take blue skies, moderate temperatures, a waterfront setting and mix them with 117 old cars, 6 antique motorcycles and a good number of swappers, what do you have? The 7th Annual Gulf Beach Antique Car Show and Swap Meet, that's what.

This year's meet was probably the best ever according to show Chairman Dave Ginn. "The variety of cars was super and the weather was really fantastic."



Co-sponsored by the Pin-Mar Inc. Antique Car Club, the City of Maderia Beach and the Madeira Beach Chamber of Commerce, this year's meet was held on October 19, 20, and 21, at the Madeira Beach Recreation Complex. This site provided a beautiful grassy area for both cars on display and the flea marketeers.

The swap meet vendors reported only so-so buisness. The variety was good, ranging from new "A" parts to license plates to wall hangings to literature, and everthing else in between, and the prices were very reasonable. Still, most vendors said they did "OK" and at least there was no mud. The real excitement was to be found in the show area, however, with an unusually wide range of very interesting cars and stories.


